

How to Play **PEANUT BUTTER & Jelly**[®]

**Parker Brothers
non-icky, non-sticky
sandwich making game**

For 2, 3 or 4 Players Ages 5 to 10

Object

The object of this game is to be the first player to make a complete peanut butter and jelly sandwich.

Equipment

Platform playing board, holders for bread, jelly, and peanut butter, four sandwich plates, four playing pieces, special game die, and printed pieces of bread, peanut butter and jelly.

Let's get ready to play

Punch out the peanut butter, jelly and bread holders.
Punch out the peanut butter, jelly and bread pieces.
Place the bread pieces in the holder over the loaf of bread, the chunks of peanut butter in the holder over the jar of peanut butter, and the jelly in the holder over the jar of jelly, being sure the pieces are placed in the proper sections in the holders. Each player takes a sandwich plate and a colored playing piece. Playing pieces are placed on the space with the arrow.

Now you're ready to play

One player is selected to be first. He rolls the die and moves his piece in the direction of the arrow along the track to the first space having some of the ingredient indicated on the die: (Peanut butter, Bread, or Jelly). There is a picture in the space showing a portion of one of these things (a quarter, half or whole). The player may take a piece of the kind and portion shown if he has a place to put it.

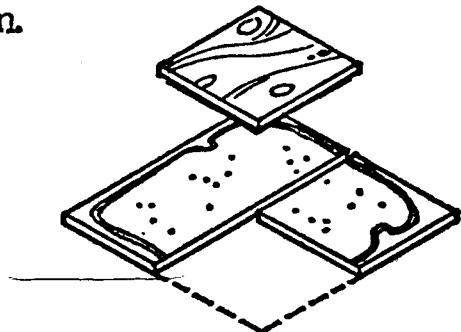
However, he **MUST** make his sandwich in the proper order. That is: He must first have a bottom layer of bread, then two layers, one of jelly and the other of peanut butter, followed by a layer of bread. A player may use either peanut butter or jelly as his second layer, but if he has started a layer of jelly by placing any piece of it over his bottom slice of bread, he must not mix that layer with peanut butter.

Important rules

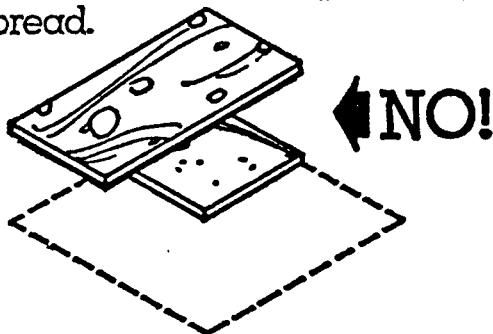
No player may take a piece on his turn unless he can use it at that time in building his sandwich.

A player must not mix peanut butter and jelly in the same layer.

A player need not complete a whole layer before putting pieces in the next layer. He could, as shown, have a partial layer of bread covered by a partial layer of jelly and so on.



But...he must place new layers directly on the layer below. Thus he could not put a half layer of jelly on a quarter piece of bread.



If he lands on an ingredient showing more than he needs he may take any portion that he needs and has room for.

If a player lands on a picture of an animal eating one of the ingredients, he must give up any one piece of that ingredient which is totally exposed on his plate. If a piece of that ingredient is partially exposed but partially covered, the player surrenders nothing.

If a player lands on a corner space he can pick any piece of the ingredient shown which he can use at that time. He also gets another turn. (The starting space allows this only after a player has made one turn around the board.)

Winning the game

First player to complete his top slice of bread, and therefore, a whole sandwich, is the winner.
