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Tit Tat Toe

For Two Players

Place the overlay card over the regular PEGITY Board. TIT TAT TOE is played in the 9 hole area marked "TIT TAT TOE." One player selects 5 red pegs, the other takes 5 yellow. Players agree who will play first. The starting player then places a peg in any one of the 9 holes. His opponent now places a peg in one of the remaining 8 holes. The game continues in this manner, each player in his turn placing a peg in one of the remaining holes until one player succeeds in getting 3 of his pegs in a straight row in any direction; i.e., up and down, across, or on a diagonal.

The first player to get 3 of his pegs in a straight row in any direction wins the game. If, however, no player is able to get 3 pegs in a row, the game becomes a draw and the players remove their pegs from the holes and start again.

Pegity Solitaire

Place the overlay card over the regular PEGITY Board. Pegity Solitaire is played in the area marked "Pegity Solitaire." A player takes 32 pegs and places a peg in each of the holes in the solitaire area except the center hole. The center hole is left empty.

The object of this solitaire is to remove pegs from the board by jumping so that the last remaining peg lands in the center hole. A *jump* consists of moving one peg over another peg in a straight line into a vacant hole immediately beyond. The peg over which the jump has been made is removed from the board. Jumps may be made backward, forward or sideways but *never diagonally*. The *first jump* must be made into the center hole and thereafter jumps may be made into any vacant hole. Jumps are the only moves permitted in this game. Play continues by jumping until only one peg remains on the board. In order to complete the solitaire this peg must land in the center hole in completing the last jump.

4-5-6

For Two Players

This is a novelty application to the game of "Pegity." Fifteen pegs of any color are placed anywhere on the board as in the accompanying

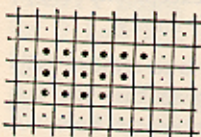


diagram. Two players sit facing each other with the board between them and the object is for one player to force his opponent to *take the last*

peg. All the pegs or as many as wished, may be taken from *any one row at a time*, but the player may not take a peg or pegs from more than one row in any single turn. Thus, the first player may take all five pegs in the second row at once, or one, two, three, or four of them. The same applies to the other rows. Remember to judge the number of pegs you take each time, so that your opponent will be forced to take the last peg.
