


## INTRODUCTION

Use of the card racks makes the four-handed games played with these cards exciting and interesting for two players.

## DEALING AND SETTING UP

Players sit as shown in the diagram with "Dummy" racks placed opposite them.

## SET UP CARDS VERTICALLY BY COLOR PLAYER "A"



(OVER)

Let us say that player B is the dealer. He deals the cards exactly as if "Dummy" racks A and B were real players. Each player sets up the cards dealt to his "Dummy" in the angle slots of the "Dummy" racks, arranging them according to color. Note that each player can see his entire "Dummy" hand but cannot see his opponent's due to the angle at which the cards are positioned.

## THE PLAY

In all of the games the regular 4-player rules apply. In some of these games, cards are not to be set up in the racks until the bidding has been completed. In the games where the rules specify that players receive 14 cards, 2 cards must be placed in one of the end slots of the card racks.

In the DISPLAY game and in the BOSTON game the "Dummy" hand of the player winning the bid is not exposed on the table but is placed in the rack just as it is in other games. This change in the rules is necessary because one of the players would be able to see three of the four hands and thus be able to locate every card in the deck if a "Dummy" were displayed.
